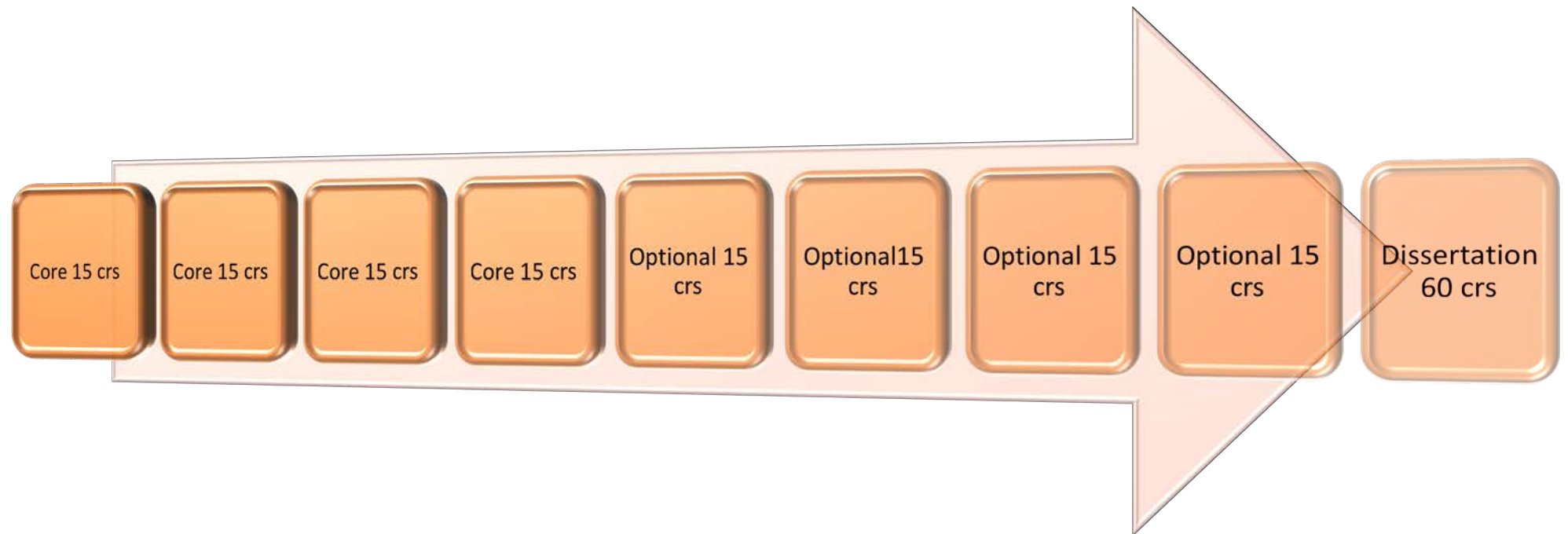

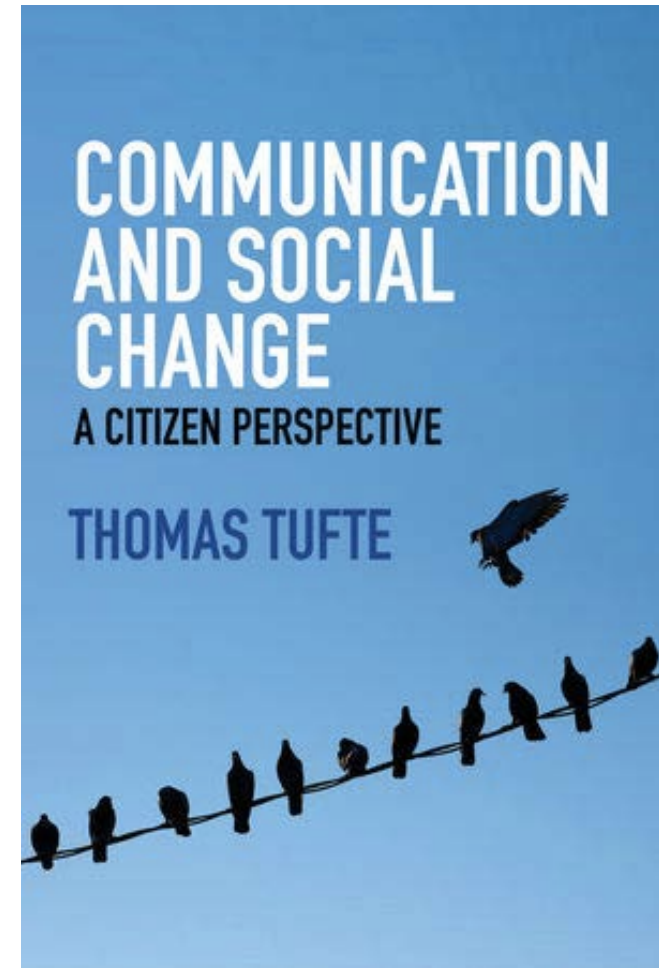

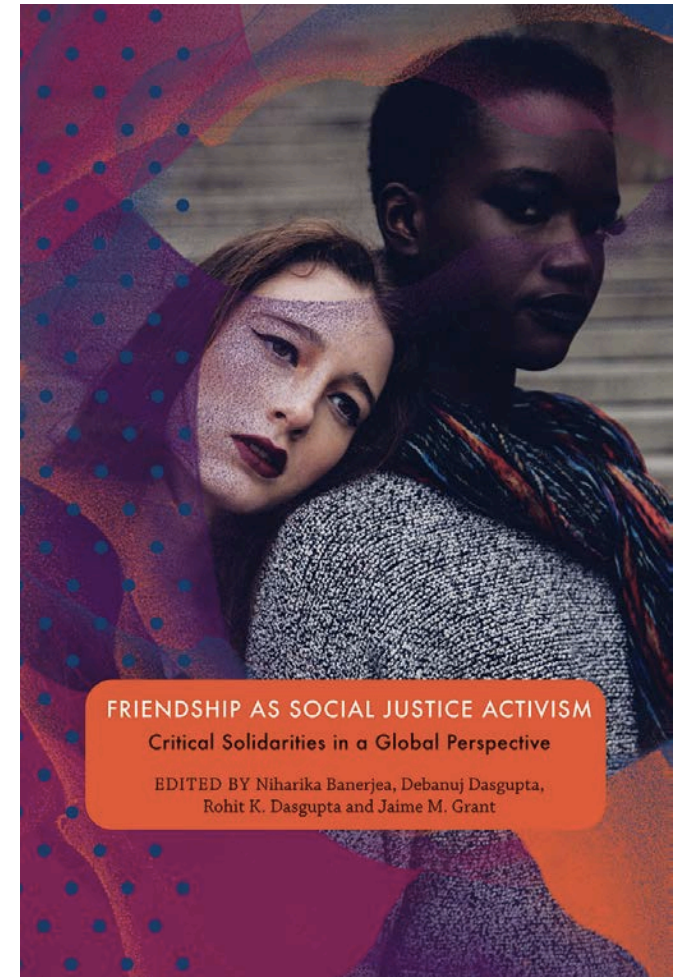
Globalisation, Communication and Social Change

- This module introduces theories of social change to critically explore the role of media and communication in a globalised and changing world. Dominant ideas about globalisation and international development will be explored and contrasted with the experiences of people from the Global South, to allow students to explore broader debates on media, communication and social change.
- The module will explore: perspectives on key concepts and terms; critiques of 'globalisation', 'media', 'development'; key approaches to media, communication, development and social change; applications and approaches: ethnography and development; participatory development: social movements and social mobilization; and social accountability and the global development agenda.



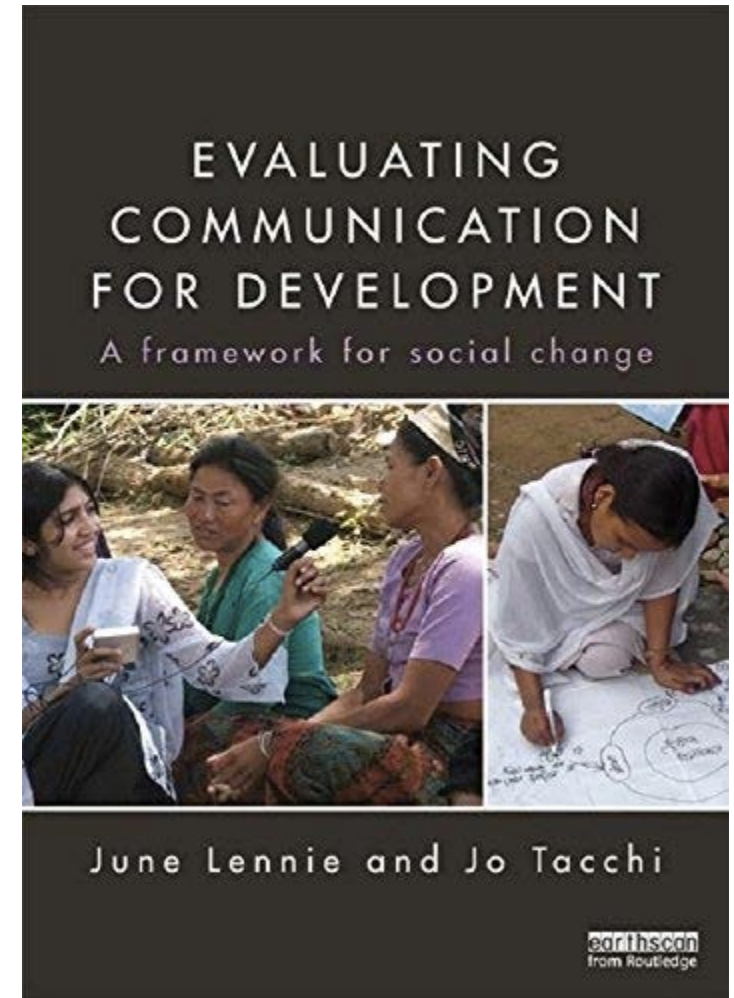
Critical Studies of the Global South

- This module aims to broaden students' knowledge and understanding of the key issues in the global South such as anti colonisation, globalisation, poverty, capitalism, solidarity and intergovernmental development organisations. Dominant ideas about around decolonization, communication media, politics of development will be explored and examined with the experiences of people from the Global South, to allow students to explore broader debates on development, politics and the media. As an area studies module it will be offer comparative perspectives on areas such as South Asia, MENA, Africa, South East Asia and Latin America.



Collaborative Project

- The overall goal of the collaborative project is to provide students with an introduction to diverse teamwork, problem solving, and the Loughborough University London community. These goals are achieved through a project-based learning exercise.
- The Collaborative project is a unique learning experience in which students with diverse backgrounds work together to solve a problem set by an external partner organisation.
